

What Parents Need to Know about Overwatch 2



In fairness to the series' developers, Overwatch 2 features some encouraging safety tweaks – the controversial loot boxes have been completely removed, for instance. Some issues *do* remain, however: the first Overwatch attracted criticism for its toxic community, which is clearly still a concern if young players are using the audio chat when fighting alongside (or against) strangers.

Likewise, in-game purchases remain a possible pitfall thanks to the game's rotating storefront system, while – despite the comparatively restrained levels of on-screen blood and gore – many trusted adults will still have reservations about a game which revolves so heavily around violence. Despite some residual safety concerns about the game itself, Overwatch's creators can certainly be applauded for its diverse and inclusive cast of heroes. One of the main characters, the time-hopping Tracer, is an extremely positive representation of the LGBTQ+ community, while others – such as the Haitian medic, Baptiste – hail from under-represented regions of the world.

The presentation of various races, sexualities and gender identities as universally accepted in the futuristic Overwatch world is heartening – and can be an excellent reference point for conversations with young people about equality and people's differences.
